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the goal of perspectives on student affairs in south africa is to generate interest in student affairs in south africa the papers contained herein are based on best practice local experience and well researched international and local theories the papers in this book deal with matters pertaining to international and national trends in student affairs

academic development access and retention counseling and material support for students coming from disadvantaged backgrounds they are linked to national and international developments as described in the first two papers this publication will assist both young and experienced practitioners as they grow into their task of developing the students entrusted to them all contributors are south africans with a great deal of experience in student affairs and all are committed to the advancement of student affairs in south africa the editors are former heads of student affairs portfolios at two leading south african universities

between 2013 and 2017 a team of researchers from the human sciences research council undertook a longitudinal qualitative study that tracked eighty students from eight diverse universities in south africa and documented their experiences at these higher education institutions

reflections of south african student leaders 1994 2017 brings together the reflections of twelve former src leaders from across the landscape of south african universities reviews of the previous volume 1981 2014 suggested that it contributed significantly to a better understanding of the stringent demands of visionary and transformative leadership required by university leaders in the fastchanging and increasingly complex public higher education sector this volume is based on comprehensive interviews with former student leaders each of whom provided a personal account in their own words of their experience in the position of student leadership the interviewees are from different backgrounds and of diverse political persuasions the book is important for current and future leaders of higher education institutions as it provides insights into the thinking aspirations desires fears and modus operandi of student leaders such insight can contribute to developing and implementing appropriate strategies for achieving meaningful and constructive engagement with current and future student leaders

examines how programs and structures at historically white universities have responded to the increasing enrollment of black students since the enactment of the universities amendment act in 1983

this book explores anti apartheid movements on university and college campuses across africa and the united states in the 1970s and 1980s in the wake of the march 1960 sharpeville massacre in south africa the country s apartheid policies drew increasing critical

international attention by the 1970s south africa found itself isolated due to growing sporting economic and cultural boycotts africans across the continent showed solidarity with black south africans through a range of boycotts and protests by hosting south africans exiled from their home country and by vilifying the apartheid government at every turn this volume looks at elite institutions as well as state colleges and universities in the united states and the actions of university students in nigeria kenya ghana and south africa during the anti apartheid movements in the 1970s and 1980s revealing the local manifestations of a global struggle the chapters showcase how vibrant campus anti apartheid movements were what universal problems emerged and where unique concerns manifested at a wide range of institutions taking innovative approaches and offering case studies struggle for a free south africa reveals the myriad ways the anti apartheid struggle manifested in a range of academic environments and how those campaigns have been remembered and documented this book was originally published as a special issue of safundi

the south african higher education system has historically been characterized by racial and gender inequities inherited from the discriminatory policies of the apartheid era from the ascent to power of the national party in 1948 tertiary institutions were divided along ethno linguistic lines in accordance with the segregationist policies of the apartheid system the 1990s ushered in a new political era characterized by the unbanning of political parties the release of political prisoners and the shift of political power from the nationalist party to the government of national unity led by the african national congress since the change of government in 1994 there has been a concerted effort to transform the system of higher education from one in which race gender and class determine access and success to a more equitable one the demise of apartheid in south africa requires that educational institutions transform in order to reflect the changing nature of the country this volume includes case studies on south african tertiary institutions immersed in the process of transformation examining the issue of language policy at afrikaans medium institutions the challenges that the historically white english medium institutions face when including a previously excluded group the experiences of black south african students enrolled at such institutions and the challenges faced by historically disadvantaged institutions

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around the world more young people than ever before are attending university student

numbers in south africa have doubled since democracy and for many families higher education is a route to a better future for their children but alongside the overwhelming demand for higher education questions about its purposes have intensified deliberations about the curriculum culture and costing of public higher education abound from student activists academics parents civil society and policy makers we know from macro research that south african graduates generally have good employment prospects but little is known at a detailed level about how young people actually make use of their university experiences to craft their life courses and even less is known about what happens to those who drop out this accessible book brings together the rich life stories of 73 young people six years after they began their university studies it traces how going to university influences not only their employment options but also nurtures the agency needed to chart their own way and to engage critically with the world around them the book offers deep insights into the ways in which public higher education is both a private and public good and it provides significant conclusions pertinent to anyone who works in and cares about universities

the politics of black education has long been a key issue in southern african studies but despite rich debates on the racial and class dimensions of schooling historians have neglected their distinctive gendered dynamics a world of their own is the first book to explore the meanings of black women s education in the making of modern south africa its lens is a social history of the first high school for black south african women inanda seminary from its 1869 founding outside of durban through the recent past employing diverse archival and oral historical sources megan healy clancy reveals how educated black south african women developed a tradition of social leadership by both working within and pushing at the boundaries of state power she demonstrates that although colonial and apartheid governance marginalized women politically it also valorized the social contributions of small cohorts of educated black women this made space for growing numbers of black women to pursue careers as teachers and health workers over the course of the twentieth century after the student uprisings of 1976 as young black men increasingly rejected formal education for exile and street politics young black women increasingly stayed in school and cultivated an alternative form of student politics inanda seminary students experiences vividly show how their academic achievements challenged the narrow conceptions of black women s social roles harbored by both officials and black male activists by the transition to democracy in the early 1990s black women outnumbered

black men at every level of education introducing both new opportunities for women and gendered conflicts that remain acute today

education in south africa is in crisis low literacy and numeracy rates poor discipline and a sense of despair pervade the education landscape at the same time educators are called upon to achieve more with universities tasked to produce graduates capable of exercising responsible and reflective citizenship in a competitive and globalising world however universities face very complex demands and resource constraints in this sobering context this book provides an opportunity to learn from a bold experiment in teaching and learning taking place across two very different south african universities one historically black and one historically white and afrikaans with a mixture rigorous scholarship thoughtful self reflection and insights which have relevance far beyond their own project contributors to this ground breaking volume take the reader systematically through an account of what is and is not possible in transforming higher education in south africa the contributors demonstrate the potential and limitations of imaginative innovations and invite the reader into an ongoing discussion about the future and potential for higher education in south africa and beyond publisher s note

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
