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a race based oppositional paradigm has informed chicano studies since its emergence in this work sandra k soto replaces that paradigm with a less didactic more flexible framework geared for a queer analysis of the discursive relationship between racialization and sexuality through rereadings of a diverse range of widely discussed writers from américo paredes to cherríe moraga soto demonstrates that representations of racialization actually depend on the sexual

and that a racialized sexuality is a heretofore unrecognized organizing principle of chican literature even in the most unlikely texts soto gives us a broader and deeper engagement with chican representations of racialization desire and both inter and intracultural social relations while several scholars have begun to take sexuality seriously by invoking the rich terrain of contemporary chicana feminist literature for its portrayal of culturally specific and historically laden gender and sexual frameworks as well as for its imaginative transgressions against them this is the first study to theorize racialized sexuality as pervasive to and enabling of the canon of chican literature exemplifying the broad usefulness of queer theory by extending its critical tools and anti heteronormative insights to racialization soto stages a crucial intervention amid a certain loss of optimism that circulates both as a fear that queer theory was a fad whose time has passed and that queer theory is incapable of offering an incisive politically grounded analysis in and of the current historical moment

american women writers have long been creating an extraordinarily diverse and vital body of fiction particularly in the decades since world war ii recent authors have benefited from the struggles of their predecessors who broke through barriers that denied women opportunities for self expression this reference highlights american women writers who continue to build upon the formerly male dominated canon included are alphabetically arranged entries for more than 60 american women writers of diverse ethnicity who wrote or published their most significant fiction after world war ii each entry is written by an expert contributor and includes 1 dba brief biography 1 dba discussion of major works and themes dba survey of the writer s critical reception 1 dba bibliography of primary and secondary sources

presents a collection of critical essays analyzing modern hispanic american writers including junot diaz pat mora and rudolfo anaya

this book visits modernism within a comparative gendered and third world framework questioning current scholarly categorisations of modernism and reframing our conception of what constitutes modernist aesthetics it describes the construction of modernist studies and argues that despite a range of interventions which suggest that philosophical and material articulations with the third world shaped modernism an emphasis on modernist universals persists ramanathan argues that women and third world authors have reshaped received notions of the modern and revised orthodox ideas on the modern aesthetic authors such as bessie head josiane racine t obinkaram echewa raja rao gabriel garcia marquez sembene ousmane salman rushdie ana castillo attia hossain bapsi sidhwa and sahar khalifeh are visited in their specific cultural contexts and use some form of realism a mode that western modernism relegates to the nineteenth century a

comparative methodology and extensive research on intersecting topics such as post coloniality and the articulation between gender and modernist aesthetics facilitates readings of the modern in twentieth century literature that fall outside standards of western modernism considering the relationship between aesthetics and ideology ramanathan lays out a critical apparatus to enhance our understanding of the modern thus suggesting that form is not universal but that the history of forms like the history of colonialism and of women indicates very specific modalities of the modern

in one of the most rapidly growing areas of literary study this volume provides the first comprehensive guide to teaching latino a literature in all variety of learning environments essays by internationally renowned scholars offer an array of approaches and methods to the teaching of the novel short story plays poetry autobiography testimonial comic book children and young adult literature film performance art and multi media digital texts among others the essays provide conceptual vocabularies and tools to help teachers design courses that pay attention to issues of form across a range of storytelling media issues of content such as theme and character issues of historical periods linguistic communities and regions issues of institutional classroom settings the volume innovatively adds to and complicates the broader humanities curriculum by offering new possibilities for pedagogical practice

this title in the scribner writers series provides in depth biographical and critical essays on more than 50 latino latina writers seven thematic essays consider each writer s works in relation to music language feminism and other key topics covering well known writers such as sandra cisneros and luis j rodriguez as well as lesser known but still significant authors such as tino villanueva and achy obegas this set gives researchers detailed coverage of the vibrant works of literature written by cuban dominican chicano and puerto rican authors

contains biographical sketches of writers who either began writing novels after 1945 or have done their most important work since then

poetic inspiration from her days as a writer who once wrote poems in a basement with no heat through the tenderness of motherhood and bitterness of loss to the strength of love itself which can make the impossible a simple act radiant with keen perception wit and urgency sometimes erotic often funny this inspiring collection sounds the unmistakable voice of a woman on fire and more worthy than stone

for more than forty years chicana author ana castillo has produced novels poems and critical essays that forge connections between generations challenge borders around race gender and sexuality and critically engage transnational issues of space identity and belonging her contributions to latinx cultural production and to chicana feminist thought have transcended and contributed to feminist praxis ethnic literature and border studies throughout the americas transnational chicanx perspectives on ana castillo is the first edited collection that focuses on castillo s oeuvre which directly confronts what happens in response to cultural displacement mixing and border crossing divided into five sections this collection thinks about castillo s poetics language and form as well as thematic issues such as borders immigration gender sexuality and transnational feminism from her first political poetry *otro canto* published in 1977 to her mainstream novels such as the *mixquiahuala letters* *so far from god* and *the guardians* this collection aims to unravel how castillo s writing impacts people of color around the globe and works in solidarity with other third world feminisms

mascaras masks brings together some of the most talented contemporary latina writers in the united states these essays illuminate the ways life and craft are entwined they are a courageous testament to the odds latina writers must overcome to clear the space and achieve a voice in our society
